'You can write your own story'

Amy Kalchik reflects on 25 years as a children's librarian in Mount Horeb

"I think I get to see the best of it," muses Amy Kalchik, youth services librarian at the Mount Horeb



Public Library. "It" in this case is simple: humanity.

For a quarter century now, Kalchik, whose bright, youthful smile belies her lengthy employment there, has helped generations of families hear, tell, and live their own stories.

"I think most stories have been around for a long time," she explains. Those tales can make people feel hope, fear, mirth, courage and more. As G.K. Chesterton famously wrote, they can teach young children that dragons can be defeated.

MoHo Planning Commission grapples with design guidelines

The April 22 Plan Commission meeting was called to order by Chair, Ryan Czyzewski. All members were present, except Peggy Zalucha. Village Planner Sonja Kruesel was also in attendance, covering for Ben Rohr.

Mirroring the village board meetings, the PC agenda (and going forward) will now include a consent agenda listing for items that are typically approved, such as a past minutes, and extra-territorial Certified Survey Maps (CSM). Any commissioner may request an item to be pulled for discussion, so it is not part of the approved consent items.

Quite a discussion ensued between two separate downtown design alteration reviews for 101 E. Main (Potterton Rule bldg.) and 105 E. Main (Hoff Mall). Prior to this meeting, both items were discussed at the Historic Preservation Commission meeting held just before this meeting, with the first request denied and the second partially denied. The issue? Black smartboard, awnings, and window trim.

The new zoning code, adopted in February and effective March 12, 2026, does not allow the color black in the Downtown Mixed Use (DMU) district. Although any paint manufacturer may be used, the code refers to the Sherwin Williams color palette for historic buildings.

Many colors, other than black, are available. In addition, building owners who request a design alteration may choose to keep existing colors if opt not to go with the historic color palette.

Andrea Potterton, 101 E. Main owner, said all new brick is being added to the second floor and the alteration requested is to change the existing blue smartboard awning, front door and blue band on the lower portion of the building to black as well as the trim for the second-floor windows. After discussion, including concern that right after the zoning code approval, a color variance was requested. One of the main intentions of the new zoning code is to avoid variances and stick with the newly written code rules. Commissioner Sarah Best motioned, Andrew Kidd seconded to stick with the HPC recommendation and deny the request to change to black for all three areas. Motion carried unanimously.

Karen Johnson, Executive Relations Officer of the Gallina Companies, presented the design alteration plans for both its 105 E. Main and 100 E. Front (Hoff Apartments) which included black with gold striped awnings for both buildings and black trim for the windows on the Hoff Mall building. The awnings would replace the existing red/white striped ones which need to be replaced due to age. The black trim windows would

match those used for the apartment building behind Hoff Mall and on E. Front Street. Johnson brought a sample of the new material for the awnings as well as a drawing of the intended new appearance of the building with the requested alterations.

Commissioner Jill Remmert-Willis questioned how is it valid to say no to the first applicant and even consider approval for the second applicant when both requested using black. Kidd agreed with her. Planner Kruesel explained Chapter 17, Section 17.7.50 (k) addresses awnings and the requirements for awnings are more liberal than alterations on the building façade.

Remmert-Willis motioned to deny the black awning request, Kidd seconded the motion. The five other commissioners voted no on the motion, therefore approving the black with gold stripe awnings on both the Hoff Mall and Hoff Apartments.

Best and commissioner Ben Vondra motioned to approve the awning design alteration and deny the black window trim request, with the window trim to remain the same as is or lighter to blend with the building color. Motion carried with Remmert-Willis and Kidd voting no.

Vondra recused himself from the next item, consideration of the Certified Survey Map (CSM) for 221 S. Fourth Street. Serena Von-

dra, his spouse, explained the Vondras purchased the property with the intention of building a second home, facing Garfield, on the lot which will be for her parents. With the new zoning code allowing reduced lot size and setbacks, the request has no variances from the code. Unanimous approval was given to recommend the CSM to the Village Board.

Nick Olday, owner of 1348 Field Court, presented for consideration a Site Plan Review for the two additional buildings, with each having two apartments, and will complement the existing two apartment buildings. In addition to the Site Plan Review, Olday requested approval of the CSM for the lot. Both the CSM and Site Plan were approved unanimously. The CSM will be recommended to the Village Board for consideration at the May meeting.

Developer and contractor Tim Kritter, owner of TJK Design Build, and John Walsh, real estate broker and Principal of Lee & Associates, presented a concept plan for 100 Lillihammer Lane. Kritter purchased the corner lot (kiddie corner from Kwik Trip) to build a multi-tenant structure with a drive thru on each end. Two anchor tenants have been secured by Walsh, Dunkin Donuts on the north side and a pickup style restaurant on the south side. The areas

between the two could hold up to three additional businesses, depending on interested tenants. Kritter and Walsh asked for feedback from the commissioners before presenting for approval the general development plan at the May 27 PC meeting. A few suggestions were made, such as adding an entrance door to Dunkin Donuts for those biking or walking east on Springdale, increasing the tower element to cover the entire depth, etc., to make pedestrians safer and avoid the drive-thru lane traffic. Kritter appreciated the feedback and will have his team make the changes discussed prior to the next meeting.

Back on the agenda was consideration/recommendation of a Public Art Ordinance. After its presentation at the March PC meeting, commissioners suggested revisions to the village planner, such as shortening it by having less repetition, and getting input from Create Wisconsin that oversees public art. Rohr returned a more concise draft Ordinance, Create Wisconsin provided its regulations, and it was reviewed by the village attorney for its constitutionality.

Kruesel summarized the purpose of the Ordinance was to create a process how public art requests are handled for murals and trolls in a consistent manner. The Ordinance is not part of the

zoning code as it is in the Licensing section of the code of Ordinances. Staff would be responsible for the administration of the program. Lastly, she mentioned there are two proposed public arts in the hopper and if the Ordinance is approved, both could move forward quickly.

The discussion for the potential Ordinance lasted for 30 minutes. All but one commissioner voiced his/her thoughts on why the need for it, why assigned to the PC when it is in the Licensing section of the Municipal Code, wouldn't a permit fee turn off artists from presenting a project, don't our existing lighting, public safety and public nuisance codes already cover regulations relating to public art, if public art cannot be regulated, why are we regulating it, this seems like a solution searching for a problem, has there been any case where a piece of public art has been a problem for village staff, how will an Ordinance be of help to staff, should we scrap the Ordinance, we need more advice, we do not have art expertise and, lastly, to the all-important question, what is or is not art?

The result? Return the topic to the planner Rohr to make it simpler and provide examples of other communities this size who do not have an art commission.

Village president offers response on committee appointments

Village president Ryan Czyzewski offered the following statement in response to criticism of his decision to remove Mount Horeb Historical Society Director Destinee Udelhoven from the village planning commission after nine years of her service there. Czyzewski and Udelhoven were on opposing sides of the Langhus on Main development debate last year:

“The nominations are about more than an individual ap-

pointment, but as I stated in the meeting, Destinee did a good job as a PC member, and she will continue to serve well on HPC,” said Czyzewski. “With the creation of the independent HPC several years ago and its updated role with the revised zoning code, I thought she is most valuable to the Village serving there and bring in a new member to PC. Plan Commission is one of the most sought-after appointments, and Stephanie is a good addi-

tion that has been interested in serving for several years. I look forward to Stephanie demonstrating her experience and knowledge of Plan Commission work, with an emphasis on historical preservation too. I fully object that if an applicant disagreed with me they were dismissed, as many of the nomination offers prove otherwise. I'm sorry that perception is out there. Several goals for implementing the application process has been to objectively

present the Board nominees that diversify committees with qualified candidates, improve risk oversight, and address the perception that new residents can't get involved in local government. It still needs work, and more applicants to help, but the process creates more engaged and informed stakeholders that benefits the Village's long-term success. As always, people may contact me directly with questions or concerns.”

Correction:

Village President Ryan Czyzewski was quoted in last week's article about the village's reorganizational meeting, as saying: "I am disappointed in the experience and am sorry for the way I conducted myself and that that is even thought of as an option as it is not." After review of the meeting's recording, what Czyzewski actually said was: "I'm disappointed that the [my] experience and the way I've conducted myself that's even thought of by some people as an option, it's not."

DATCP denies Sheriff Office's request for beagle breeder walk-through

On April 14, Dane County Sheriff Calvin Barrett submitted a written request to the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP), asking to ac-

company them on an unannounced walk-through at Ridgman Farm in the Town of Blue Mounds.

On April 15, sheriff Barrett received a response from DATCP denying that

request.

DACTP confirmed that it continues to conduct unannounced inspections. According to the Dane County Sheriff's Office, the letter went on to confirm that

should their inspectors find violations of state animal cruelty laws, they would contact local law enforcement and/or a Humane Officer for further investigation.

DATCP acknowledged

that “an on-site assessment by the Dane County Sheriff's Office may be sensible, but does not necessitate DATCP participation.”

DATCP also confirmed that Ridgman Farms has agreed to voluntarily surrender its DATCP dog seller license, on or before July 1, 2026, and will no longer operate as a dog breeder as defined by Wisconsin Statute 173.41.

“The Sheriff's Office heard our citizens' concerns about the welfare of the dogs at Ridgman Farms, and we've made every effort to address

them,” said Barrett.

“Without DATCP's legal authority and expertise in state-licensed animal welfare requirements, the Sheriff's Office lacks both legal authority and expertise in state-licensed animal welfare requirements to conduct an inspection on our own.” If the Sheriff's Office receives credible complaints of crimes against animals at Ridgman Farms or any other location within our jurisdiction, we will investigate those complaints,” Barrett added.

Obituary

Leo Clerkin



Barneveld – Leo Clerkin, age 90, of Barneveld went to be with his Lord on Tuesday, April 21, 2026. He was born on the 19th of July, 1935 to Peter and Mary Clerkin in Dodgeville, Wisconsin. Leo always said he had a good life. He grew up during the great depression and loved to talk about the ways he and his family made life work with what they had. He grew up on a dairy farm and attended a one room school house until he was in 7th grade when he and his family moved to a farm in the Barneveld School District. He attended Barneveld Public School and enjoyed playing football, basketball and baseball. He

graduated from Barneveld Public School in 1953.

During high school Leo hauled cans of milk for a local cheese factory, after high school he worked for Bill Thousand, Barneveld Gas and Electric installing televisions, which had just been invented. In March of 1955 he joined the army and served during the Korean war. When he was home on his first leave, from the army, he married his wife of 71 years, Norene (Reuter), whom he started dating in high school. They lived their first two years of married life in San Antonio, Texas, Colorado Springs, Colorado, Fort Riley in Kansas and finally Fort Eustice in Virginia where he served in the surgical unit.

After the service Leo became a dairy farmer, something he always wanted to do. After 3 years of renting, he and his wife purchase the Shelby Raisebeck farm north of Barneveld. They farmed until 1983 when Leo’s issues with his back caused him to sell the farm and build a home near the farm. He found a career

taking care of the Summit Apartments property in Barneveld. He enjoyed getting to know the residents over the years, even after he no longer took care of the property, many were his friends. He also began driving bus for the Mt. Horeb School District and the Barneveld Public School District. He did serve as the bus coordinator for the Barneveld School District and was proud he was able to stop the purchase of the bus service to a private company while serving as coordinator. In 2018, the year he retired from bus driving and received a certificate of appreciation for his 30 years of service to the state of Wisconsin as a bus driver.

Leo had passion for sports, he enjoyed professional, college and high school sports. His children were active in sports in high school and he enjoyed watching them play, but his greatest enjoyment was watching his grandchildren play basketball and baseball. He was proud to watch his granddaughters play in the Wisconsin State Basketball tournament and

become state champs. His grandchildren played for Barneveld and Pecatonica schools which kept him finding balance between the two rival schools.

Golf was a passion Leo discovered in his forties. He spent many hours playing golf at Deer Valley Golf Course in Barneveld. Then he started taking trips to Florida, in January, with his brothers to play golf, this tradition lasted for 20 years.

Leo was a devout catholic and served as a lector for 50 years, was on the building committee after the Barneveld tornado and served on church council. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus.

Community was important to Leo, he was a member of the American Legion, member of the Barneveld Advancement Association and drove ambulance for 10 years for the Barneveld Rescue Squad. He received honors as well, Outstanding Young Farmer, Iowa County, Wisconsin, Parade Marshall for the Barneveld Fair parade, inductee into the Barneveld Athletic Hall

of Fame, Knight of Columbus Council #10905 Family of the Year and his most cherished honor was the dedication in the Barneveld School yearbook.

He is survived by his wife Norene, his children, Greg (Heidi), Mike (Mary Jo), Diane Beckmann (Don Hipwood), Pat (Sue), Carol Nortman (Paul), Frank, Linda Hendrickson (Steve), Helen Ramdsen (Rob), 29 grandchildren, and 22 great grandchildren. He is further survived by his brothers Tom, Bob (Julie) and sister Donna. Sister-in-laws Pat Bowen, Connie (Roger) Evers and Cindy Reuter. Sister-in-law Veronica Reuter, Bob (Diane) Reuter, Richard (Linda) Reuter and many nieces and nephew. In addition lifelong friends Doug and Judy Johnson.

‘Alive as you and Me’



Hill

On May 1, at 7 p.m., the remarkable theater presentation of “Joe Hill, Alive As You And Me” will be performed. The venue for the event is the historic 1868 Blue Mounds Opera House, located at 2969 Main Street in the Village of Blue Mounds. The event will be hosted by the SouthWest Wisconsin Area Progressives, (SWWAP). The event is free and open to the public. The theater project was initiated by Fermat’s Last Theater Company and features Folksinger, actor, and storyteller Tom Kastle. The production honors the memory of Joe Hill, a martyred poet and labor leader,

The musical delves into the life and songs of Joe Hill, a labor organizer and songwriter for the Industrial Workers of the World, which was founded in 1905. Joe Hill strongly believed in the IWW’s guiding principle that men and women of all races and nations could unite to “change the unequal conditions of society through legitimate direct action.” For Hill, music and the power of song served as the tools to bring people together. He became one of the most influential topical musicians of the 20th century, and his legacy of protest and activism remains relevant today.

On November 19, 1915, Joe Hill was executed by firing squad in Salt Lake City, Utah. His crime was writing songs. What follows, described by the show’s creator is “an evening of songs, stories, and solidarity”

Activists sue county exec & sheriff over response at Ridglan Farms

Utah women file lawsuit against local officials

Two Utah women who participated in the April 18 “rescue” mission at Ridglan Farms filed suit against Dane County officials and the dog breeding facility’s owners alleging that they were subjected to excessive force which violated their constitutional rights.

Activists have repeatedly broken into the scientific research and dog breeding facility, including on April 18, when protestors, whose numbers appeared to at least equal the rural town’s population of roughly 900, blocked roadways and smashed the property’s front gate with an SUV. Activists stood along the winding roads that weave through the area’s small farms, holding signs showing beagles with slogans such as “I am not a science experiment.” By the end of the day, law enforcement said they had made 25 arrests.

According to the complaint filed April 23 in federal court in Madison:

Plaintiffs Joanna Baird and Linda Gregersen were among the hundreds of individuals who appeared at Ridglan in the town Blue Mounds on April 18 “to save some 2,000 beagles there.” They intended to remain non-violent and were met by 100s of law enforcement officers positioned behind a manure-filled trench, large hay bales and a fence.

Dane County Sheriff Kalvin Barrett issued a statement on April 15 saying “all available resources” would be deployed to maintain peace and promised to protect everyone involved, including the rescuers.

On April 18, Barrett said that he “pre-planned a tiered response to resistance” and to those who tried to break into the facility would be met with rubber bullets, pepper balls and other deterrent measures, which said were

“appropriate and proportionate.”

The plaintiffs believe that Barrett and Dane County Executive Melissa Agard knew about Ridglan’s manure trenches and agreed with Barrett’s “tiered response” to the protesters.

Baird, 51, crossed over the putrid-smelling trench, the hay bales and, with three other “rescuers” approached the fence where about 10 gun-toting men, dressed in black, with some wearing gas masks stood.

Baird asked if she could cross through a hole in the fence and speak to them about the dogs allegedly being abused at Ridglan.

They allege that without warning, one of the men pushed his knee into Baird’s leg and sprayed her face with tear gas. Baird felt her body was on fire and couldn’t open her eyes or breathe. Another “rescuer” carried Baird away but fell with her into the manure

trench before reaching a medic area the “rescuers” had set up.

For four hours burn cream was applied to Baird’s face and hands but she remained blind and skin peeled off her face.

Gregersen, 52, was behind Baird and was pepper sprayed by the men in black clothing, some with “Contractor” displayed on their backs. When Gregersen turned away, tear gas was thrown in her direction four times which halted her breathing.

When Gregersen reached the medic area she saw that about 20 other “rescuers” were screaming in pain while five more tear gas bombs were thrown in their direction.

She believed about 200 law enforcement personnel were present, including state troopers with guns and batons.

The tear gas created a substantial and unjustified risk

of bodily injury, amounting to reckless endangerment to those present, they claimed.

Plaintiffs said they were not given a chance to retreat or avoid further exposure and after the chemical agents were deployed, 911 refused to appear.

The tear gas injured those who were not threatening the officers and remained non-violent.

The suit holds Agard, Barrett and up to 25 “John Does” responsible for the injuries the “rescuers” received due to the excessive force used against them. Barrett also failed to intervene to stop the use of tear gas once the “rescuers” were visibly impaired.

The suit seeks class-action status for the “rescuers” injured by the alleged unlawful acts of the defendants and punitive damages for the violation of their constitutional protections against unlawful search and seizure.

The activists allege that Ridglan Farms constructed the manure trench which was part of the scheme to expose non-violent persons to contaminated material and was a willing participant in the actions of the county officials.

The county cited Ridglan for constructing a manure storage facility without a permit.

A spokesperson for Barrett said the sheriff’s office doesn’t comment on pending litigation.

Agard’s spokesperson hadn’t responded to a request for comment by deadline. Ridglan’s promised comment hadn’t been received by deadline.

Ridglan agreed to surrender its state dog breeding license by July in an agreement with a special prosecutor investigating allegations of animal abuse.

transportation team conducted a thorough review of the bus. The bus delivery timeline was extended due to a third-party ordering error, missing heating,

and an incorrect charge port location that required retrofitting, and was complicated by manufacturing errors such as a corroded electrical panel and a software defect. While some of these challenges are not uncommon with newer technolo-

gies, they require careful consideration to ensure the investment delivers long-term value and dependable service for students and our taxpayers.

The District recognizes its exceptional transportation team for its diligence,

expertise, and commitment to serving students and the community. Their careful evaluation and attention to detail have been critical in identifying concerns with the manufactured bus and guiding a thoughtful, responsible recommendation

to the Board of Education.

The EPA Clean School Bus Program Rebate offered the District \$200,000 in EPA funding with a firm May 31, 2026, deadline, making it necessary to decline the bus. Outside the warranty period, fixes for this bus would be

costly.

While the District will not move forward immediately, it remains interested in the future of electric transportation and will continue to explore options that meet operational expectations and financial priorities.

Career & Technical Education Month Spotlight: Youth Apprenticeships

Turn Classroom Skills into Real-World Careers

The Mount Horeb Area School District's Youth Apprenticeship (YA) program is a key Career & Technical Education (CTE) initiative that connects classroom learning to real-world careers.

This year, 42 Mount Horeb High School students are enrolled in Youth Apprenticeships, earning paid work experience, high school credit, and career-ready skills.

Youth Apprenticeship is a state-certified CTE program that combines career-focused coursework with mentored, on-the-job training. Students participating in YA are required to be enrolled in a related CTE course, ensuring classroom instruction directly supports workplace learning and skill development.

Mount Horeb High School's extensive Career and Technical Education department plays a critical role

in making Youth Apprenticeship accessible to students in the Mount Horeb community. With a wide range of career-related CTE courses offered in-house, students are able to meet YA program requirements while aligning coursework directly to their apprenticeship experience. Keeping required coursework within the building also reinforces equity and access, ensuring all students can participate without relying on outside programs.

"Career and Technical Education is about relevance, skill development, and preparation for life after high school," said Craig Smith, School to Career Coordinator. "Youth Apprenticeship brings CTE courses to life by showing students how their learning directly connects to their future careers."

Students are currently participating in Youth Apprenticeships across CTE-aligned career clusters, such as construction (all trades), engineering, hospitality, finance/accounting, health science, auto mechanics, biotechnology, manufacturing, agriculture, and animal science, with other pathways still available. Students work in partnership with local and regional employers who serve as mentors and training providers.

"Youth Apprenticeship gave me real experience instead of just guessing what a career might be like. Working while taking related accounting classes helped me figure out what I enjoy and what I'm good at," shared senior Julia Zimmer, Youth Apprentice in Finance at Farmer Savings Bank.

In addition to technical training, YA opportunities, and the experiential learning in CTE help students build essential employability skills such as communication, teamwork, time management, and problem-solving—skills emphasized across all CTE programs and highly valued by employers.

Participation in Youth Apprenticeship also has a measurable economic impact on the local community. With 42 students working a minimum of 450 hours per year at an average of \$15 per hour, Mount Horeb youth apprentices collectively earn approxi-

mately \$283,500 annually. As high school students, an estimated 70–80 percent of those wages are spent locally on transportation, food, retail, and services, returning roughly \$200,000 or more directly back into the Mount Horeb community each year.

The Youth Apprenticeship program is coordinated in partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development and aligns with Mount Horeb's Academic and Career Planning (ACP) efforts, helping students make informed decisions about their education and career pathways.

As Mount Horeb celebrates Career and Technical Education Month, the Youth Apprenticeship program stands as a strong example of how CTE prepares students not just for a job, but for a future—through relevant coursework, hands-on experience, and meaningful community partnerships.

Manchester will be a Badger

Mount Horeb standout signs with Wisconsin

The process was long, grueling, even frustrating at various points.

Each time Mount Horeb basketball standout Josh Manchester felt his future home was coming into focus, something would muddy the waters.

Patience and persistence, though, eventually won the day. And when Manchester reached the finish line, he did so on cloud nine.

Manchester received a full scholarship from the University of Wisconsin — the team and program he grew up idolizing — and he accepted the offer on April 21.

“When they made the offer, I just said, ‘When do I start?’” Manchester said. “I mean, I took it without thinking twice. When you get an offer from a place like that, you don’t play with it or think about it too long. You take it.”

Manchester becomes the first player from Mount

Horeb to receive a Division 1 basketball scholarship. Former Vikings standout Mark Emerson played at North Dakota State in the mid-1970s, but the Bison competed in Division 2 at the time.

Manchester had offers from Northern Illinois, UW-Green Bay, Siena and East Tennessee State, but wanted to play in a Power 4 conference. Just days prior to becoming a Badger, Manchester indicated he was leaning towards walking on at Iowa State.

“That’s probably what I would have done,” Manchester said. “But Iowa State was still figuring some things out, so I wasn’t sure if I would have been a walk-on there or it might have been a scholarship.”

He didn’t have to wait to find out.

On April 19, Mount Horeb coach Todd Nesheim reached out to UW coach Greg Gard to sing Manches-

Rebuild? Not the softball Vikings

Mount Horeb improves to 11-2

Heavy graduation losses usually means a rebuilding season inside most programs.

That isn’t the case, though, for the two-time defending Badger Small Conference champion Mount Horeb softball team.

The Vikings’ youthful squad continued to display that they are reloading and not rebuilding during an 8-6 win over Portage on April 23.

Junior third baseman Elaina Imbus went 4-for-4 to power a 12-hit attack, while sophomore right-hander Ella Baber survived a six-run fifth inning and finished with 12 strikeouts as the Vikings rebounded from a four-run deficit to surge past the visiting Warriors.

That helped highlight a week in which the Vikings won four of five games and improved to 11-2 overall.

Mount Horeb is also 5-1 in the Badger Small Conference, trailing only league-leading Stoughton (8-0, 11-1).

“I always believed we’d come back,” said Baber, who allowed six runs, three earned, on six hits with four walks in pitching a complete game. “We were all cheering and yelling, ‘We got this’ and being positive. My pitching coach always reminds me about positivity and believing in myself.”

Mount Horeb held off Portage 4-2 in the team’s first meeting on April 7.

But the Vikings earned a sweep the hard way after Portage used four hits, an error and two walks to score six runs in the top of the fifth inning to grab what appeared to be a comfortable 6-2 lead.

However, Mount Horeb — which has made five consecutive sectional appearances and lost in the

sectional championship game a year — scored two runs in the fifth inning and regained the lead for good with a four-run seventh inning to remain one game back in the loss column of league-leading Stoughton.

“The biggest thing I told the girls is, you’re only down by four runs,” Mount Horeb manager Jeramie Holman said, when the team met before the Vikings turn at the plate in the bottom of the fifth inning. “You can’t get them all back at once. You get two here, you’re down by two and we’ve got two innings to get them back.”

“You get a couple here and one there and you only have to score one run and you can do that. You’ve got to have a positive attitude.”

Portage (4-4, 2-4) pitcher Trinity Williams allowed two runs on seven hits with one walk and three strike-

“Josh Kuntz and Jackson Myers are both swinging it well as we expected,” Finley said. “They are both great baseball players. We just need to do a better job of getting guys on base when they come up so they have more opportunities to try guys in.”

• **Fort Atkinson 11, Mount Horeb 2** — The host Blackhawks pounded out 13 hits and beat up the Vikings on April 23.

Mount Horeb starter Brecken Dudley allowed 10 hits and eight runs (five earned) in three innings and took the loss. Josh Kuntz went 2-for-3 and scored two runs to lead the Vikings’ offense.

The Vikings also killed themselves with five errors. “Give credit to Fort Atkinson for hitting the ball like they did, but again, we

didn’t help ourselves at all,” Ryan Finley said. “We committed five errors and didn’t make a few other plays that were there to be made. This conference is too good to give as many freebies as we did this week and expect to have any success.

“Despite how well they hit, they shouldn’t be scoring 11 runs on 13 hits and we are giving them a lot of momentum and confidence at the plate with our mistakes defensively. I think some of our offensive struggles are carrying over to the

Freshman Isla Odgers — who entered the game as a pinch hitter in the fourth inning and delivered an RBI single — lined a lead-off single to left field to begin the inning. After junior center fielder Jozie Clifton singled to center, Nicewander reached base on an infield error to load the bases.

Imbus followed by ripping an 0-1 pitch from Chilson to center field to score Odgers and Clifton to tie the game at 6-6.

“I did what I do best, I hit the ball in the gaps,” said

Imbus, who finished with four runs batted in.

Imbus’ line drive to center field brought on reliever Anna Considine, who promptly walked Casey to load the bases.

But after Considine struck out Baber, Schrieber did exactly what the Vikings preached — put the ball in play. Schrieber hit a hard ground ball to third base and reached first on a throwing error, which scored Nicewander and Imbus to give Mount Horeb the lead for good at 8-6.

“I had seen their first baseman was struggling with scooping the ball and their third baseman with throwing the ball,” Schrieber said with a smile. “I thought, if I could put the ball in play, something good could happen, and it did happen. I just had to run hard to first base.”

That set the stage for the top of the seventh inning and decision time for Holman.

“In the sixth, I said if one runner gets on, Jozie (Clifton) is coming in,” Holman said he told Baber. “But she got through the sixth.

“Once we got the lead, I said ‘all right, it’s your game to win now.’ We’ve got the lead for you. You pitched hard. It’s your time. You’ve got two runs to play with. You end it yourself, and she did.”

While Clifton was ready, willing and able to take over in the circle, Baber showed her mettle despite Portage putting the tying runs on base with two outs in the seventh.

Baber earned her sixth victory of the season when she caught Eliana Considine looking at strike three and the Vikings secured the victory.

“When we got the lead, that relieved the pressure. I felt more comfortable out there,” Baber said of the sixth inning rally. “I like that we’re having fun and no one is down on each other. We’re all really, positive with each other. That’s different from other teams I’ve been on. I like that.”

After Stoughton and River Valley both rallied to deal Mount Horeb its two losses this season, Clifton said the comeback win over Portage was a lesson learned.

“It’s from our other games. We lost to Stoughton 9-8. We knew how they came back,” Clifton said. “We believed we could come back. We stayed up and got our energy up. It was our first time being down and really being able to come back. It was good for us to do that.”

Clifton said the victory was also a confidence boost for Baber in her first varsity season.

“Jayse (Holman) graduates, but Ella steps in — literally, it’s like having another Jayse,” Clifton said

of the hard-throwing Baber, who has reached 62 miles an hour in the circle. “Ella is very similar to Jayse. She’s quick. She’s faster than me, which is good. She’s really, intense. She’d doing really, good on the mound.”

Clifton said Baber’s poise when Portage sent 10 batters to the plate in the fifth inning, was a key to the comeback.

“She didn’t get rattled. As a team, we stayed calm,” Clifton said. “We knew what we needed to do to get back in the game. We kept our heads up. We’ve dealt with a lot of errors. But we don’t rebuild, we reload.”

• **River Valley 7, Mount Horeb 5** — The host Black-hawks rallied from an early 4-0 deficit and handed the Vikings their second straight loss on April 20.

Mount Horeb scored one run in the first and three in the second to take a quick 4-0 lead. River Valley countered, though, with two runs in the bottom of the second and five in the third.

Second baseman Emily Wittenwyler led Mount

Horeb’s offense going 2-for-3 with a double, two RBIs and a run scored. Delaina Nicewander also had a double, an RBI and scored a run.

Pitcher Ella Baber had a double and scored a run, and third baseman Elaina Imbus had a double.

Jozie Clifton started and took the loss for Mount Horeb. Baber threw the final 3 1/3 innings, struck out seven and didn’t allow a hit or a run.

• **Mount Horeb 12, Sauk Prairie 5** — Ella Baber struck out 13 and the Vikings pounded out 14 hits in rolling past the Eagles on April 21.

Baber went the distance to pick up the win, allowing three earned runs and just four hits.

Center fielder Jozie Clifton and first baseman Claire Casey both had a big days at the plate. Clifton went 3-for-4 with two runs scored and an RBI, while Casey went 3-for-5 with an RBI and a run scored.

Second baseman Emily Wittenwyler and Delaina

Nicewander both had two RBIs and Nicewander added a double. Third baseman Elaina Imbus scored two runs, while catcher Sonja Schreiber and Baber both had RBIs.

Mount Horeb struck for four runs in the third inning and three in the fourth to grab a 7-0 lead and rolled from there. The Vikings also benefitted from seven Sauk Prairie errors.

• **Mount Horeb 4, Jefferson 1 (Game 1)** — Jozie Clifton threw 5 1/3 strong innings to lift the Vikings past the Eagles in Game 1 of a doubleheader last Saturday.

Clifton allowed just one earned run, struck out four, allowed six hits and two walks. Ella Baber then recorded all five outs via strikeout to end things.

Elaina Imbus went 3-for-3 to lead the offense, while Emily Wittenwyler and Sunny Schrieber both had doubles.

• **Mount Horeb 7, Jefferson 5 (Game 2)** — Ella Baber struck out 12 and the Vikings pounded out 13 hits

to sweep the doubleheader last Saturday.

Baber went the distance, allowing five runs (two earned) while throwing strikes on a whopping 105 of 152 pitches (69.1%).

Baber also had a pair of doubles, had an RBI and scored a run, while Emily Wittenwyler went 2-for-4 with three RBIs. Delaina Nicewander went 3-for-4 with an RBI and both Lauren Mester and Jozie Clifton had two hits.

ter’s praises. Nesheim and Gard have a long history from the time their wives — Kolleen Nesheim and Michelle Gard — shared a classroom together.

The Badgers had shown interest in Manchester since his breakout freshman season at Mount Horeb, and the Vikings’ standout attended a few UW practices during his sophomore season.

Things between Manchester and UW had quieted, though, and Nesheim wanted to get the ball rolling again.

“I’ve always thought Josh could play at that level,” Nesheim said of Manchester competing in the Big Ten.

Nesheim sent Gard some recent videos of Manchester on April 20, and by April 21, Manchester and his parents — Paul and Kristine — visited the UW staff.

Gard had a lengthy presentation ready on what UW brings — both on and off the court. Shortly thereafter, basketball general manager Marc VandeWettering offered Manchester a scholarship.

Manchester grew up a die-hard Badger fan and has been going to games since he was a tot. So when the

offer became official, Manchester was both stunned and euphoric.

“It was just crazy,” said Manchester, whose sister Katie also attends UW and will be a senior this fall. “If I had to pick a college back in middle school, it would have been Wisconsin. It was a surreal moment, just crazy.”

The 6-foot-3 Manchester is one of the top scorers in state history, ranking 10th all-time with 2,532 career points. Manchester averaged a whopping 30.1 points per game last season and was named to the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association’s Division 2 all-state first team.

Manchester was also named Player of the Year in the Badger Small Conference for a second straight season and was a finalist for Wisconsin’s coveted Mr. Basketball Award.

Manchester, a combo guard, made a team-high 60 3-pointers and shot 83.1% from the free throw line last season. Manchester also led the Vikings with 3.1 assists and 3.6 steals per game and added 4.2 rebounds per contest.

Manchester helped Mount Horeb go 67-15 in the last three seasons and win three consecutive regional titles

for the first time in school history.

“His ability to score in multiple ways at all three levels was incredible,” Nesheim said of Manchester. “He was probably not known for his defense, but yet made a ton of plays with his ability to steal the ball and was a good rebounder.”

Interestingly, Gard recruited Paul Manchester — Josh’s father — to UW-Platteville three decades ago. Gard was an assistant for Bo Ryan and the Pioneers at the time, while Paul Manchester was a standout at La Crosse Logan.

“It’s truly amazing how this profession and game can bring people full circle more than 30 years later,” Gard said.

While Josh Manchester is heading to his dream school, earning playing time will undoubtedly be a tall task.

The Badgers have signed international guards Jackson Ball of New Zealand and Owen Foxwell of Australia this offseason. Wisconsin added guard Trey Autry (George Washington) and wing Eian Elmer (Miami-Ohio) in the transfer portal, and brings back guards Hayden Jones, Zach Kinzinger and Jack Janicki.

That means minutes could be tough to come by early

on. “Just like everybody else, I know you start at the bottom and have to work your way up,” Manchester said. “I’m just excited to get the opportunity. I’m coming in, not expecting anything. I’m going to work my butt off and hopefully work my way up.”

That’s how Gard views it, too.

“As we continue to intentionally build out our roster, it’s vital to have players in a variety of roles,” Gard said. “Josh appreciates and understands the work and development that his role will require. He’s got a competitor’s mindset paired with a knack for scoring.”

Manchester has never shied away from a challenge, though.

In recent years, Manchester had tremendous success playing AAU ball for Team Herro on the Nike EYBL circuit. So betting against him succeeding at UW could be risky business.

“Josh is really fired up to be a Badger,” Gard said. “We can’t wait for him to arrive on campus this summer and get to work preparing for the coming season.”

Manchester, who carries a 3.9 GPA, will head to campus on June 10 to begin summer workouts. He’ll

also begin taking summer classes as he pursues an Analytics degree.

On some levels, the recent whirlwind that took Manchester to Wisconsin feels almost dreamlike.

Two weeks ago, Manchester had no idea where he’d land when college basketball’s unending game of musical chairs stopped this offseason. Now, he’s at his dream school, has a full

scholarship and is a stone’s throw away from his hometown.

“There’s a lot of happy people in the community, and I’ve been getting a lot of congratulations and that’s been so great,” Manchester said. “I’m just so glad I waited and found the perfect fit for me. It was a very long process, and it was overwhelming at times, but it had a great ending.”

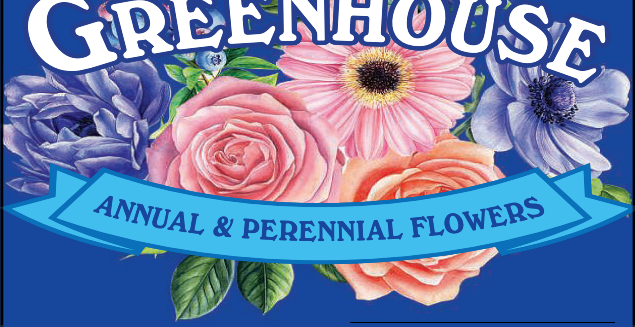

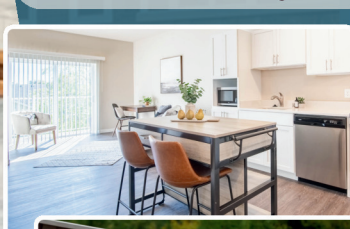
