### United Way's 211 app expands access to critical resources

Bilingual mobile app and kiosk network offer vital services

When families in crisis need help, they often don't know where to turn. For decades, United Way's 211 phone service has offered a simple solution: dial three numbers to be connected with trained staff who can guide callers to food pantries, housing support, util-

ity assistance, mental health care, and more.

But calling isn't always easy. Some hesitate out of embarrassment. Others fear that disclosing too much might lead to unwanted attention—especially immigrants worried about their status. And for younger generations accustomed to digital tools, a phone call can feel like a barrier.



That's why United Way of Dane County has built a new pathway: a statewide

211 mobile app, available in both English and Spanish, that puts more than 1,100 resources at a user's fingertips.

The app, launched in November 2023, was made possible by a Madison-area donor. A Spanish-language version followed in July 2024, though it took far longer than expected to develop. "Our developers told us, 'We'll just use Google

Translate,'" said Ed Wall, director of 211. "But it made no sense—it was gibberish."

Instead, United Way partnered with Centro Hispano and bilingual staff to manually translate more than 750 categories. What was supposed to take three weeks stretched into 10 months. But the effort paid off. "Over five percent of

### Opponents of downtown development hold another meeting to voice concerns

A second meeting by a newly-formed group that opposes what they see as large-scale development downtown was held in the cafeteria at the Intermediate Center school on Wednesday, September 17. About 45 people attended, includ-

ing fresh faces as well as some repeats who attended their first meeting in August. A local TV news reporter interviewed Michelle Kelley, the spokesperson for the group, as well as recorded the event.

People were asked to sign-in and provide an email address for future commu-

nications on the proposed Main Street development, existing zoning code requirements as well as ongoing information on the current zoning code re-write. Yard signs were available to attendees for a five-dollar donation.

Once everyone was settled, Kelley kicked off

the meeting by introducing other committee members, Tammy Clarey, Brian LaDow, Sharman Moen and Jackie Sale. Attendees received a packet of information showing four views of the most recent building design submitted by J. G. Development for the proposed four-story, 66 apartment unit

from 214-220 E. Main.

Kelley said, "According to the developer's material, it is estimated each floor is 24,000 sq ft., with nine percent commercial and ninety-one percent residential and parking."

The first floor includes the commercial space and continued on page 4

## Village could lose its charm

As a member of a family that has been a part of Mount Horeb for generations, I find what is being proposed by JG Development for the 200 block of East Main Street very distressing. I have attended many meetings about this project and I think I have a good understanding of what will happen and how it will affect us all.

This structure, if built as proposed, will be massive. It will have four stories and span the entire area from MHTC to Third Street. There will be no green space left on the block as this building will also span from Main Street to the alley. It is touted as being a mixed-use building since it will have retail space for 3 to 4 businesses on the ground floor while the remaining three floors will be made up of 66 apartments. That’s right, 66. There will be 83 bedrooms in all. Onsite parking is planned for 69 cars. The parking situation will not be adequate as most households have more than one car. All these extra vehicles trying to access Main Street via the alley or Third Street during peak hours will only exacerbate traffic issues. I have also learned that in order to build this apartment many

zoning codes, that are in effect now for this space, will be violated. This building is not attractive, in my opinion, and it will add nothing to the ambience of the downtown. I believe it will irreparably change the historic charm and uniqueness of Mount Horeb’s business corridor. It will create a precedent for future development on Main Street. It is beyond my understanding why Jeff Grundahl, a native son, would even propose something like this in this location for his home town. A better option, I think, would be for the developer to come up with a scaled down design that somehow incorporates the existing historic buildings. The two buildings in question are well over one hundred years old and have been part of Main Street for as long as anyone alive today can remember.

I think they are worth saving. Instead of one monolithic looking structure there could be a cluster of connected smaller buildings which include the two existing buildings. Such a well thought out and creative design would allow for some green space and flower beds. If the architects concentrated on designing retail spaces that would be more affordable and attractive to locate artists and smaller boutiques, we could have even more interesting and unique shops to draw in visitors. (From what I’m hearing, the retail spots in the developer’s latest design might be too expensive for small business owners to rent and might only be affordable to retail chains.)

There could be some residential rentals but not anywhere the number proposed by the developer’s latest design which would be detrimental to the quality of life of the people living in the vicinity and negatively impact traffic and parking on the surrounding streets. There are many better spots around town for high den-

sity apartment buildings than on Main Street. A well thought out design that is unique to Mount Horeb would be a structure I would enjoy looking at and, I hope, so would our visitors. This is a crucial point for our community. What is built here will set the tone for what may follow.

We have to decide in what direction we want our downtown to go. Do we want to remain a charming destination community that people enjoy visiting or follow the example of surrounding communities and lose all of what is special about Mount Horeb?

I sincerely hope that is not the case and that our leaders will abide by the Comprehensive Plan that was carefully put in place to protect our unique culture and character.

Have you noticed the red “It’s Too BIG” signs popping up around town? These signs represent a campaign to increase awareness of, and opposition to, the proposal to build a large apartment complex right on our Main Street. The proposed complex will occupy most of the block on Main Street between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Streets. It will extend to four stories, with retail space at street level and three additional levels of apartments (66 units).

Why the opposition? For those of us who appreciate the charm and character of downtown Mount Horeb, this structure will stand out as a modernistic monolith dominating the downtown

district and dwarfing all other historic structures along Main Street.

For decades, many concerned citizens have thoughtfully and diligently engaged in the planning and development of Mount Horeb’s downtown growth, with deliberation centered on preserving and maintaining our downtown charm and character. As a result, Mount Horeb has become a popular destination for travelers looking to experience small-town Wisconsin, as well as a source of pride for our local community.

The current zoning code requirements for new construction reflect the thoughtful and deliberate planning that has made Mount Horeb’s Main Street a unique travel destination and vibrant business district. Unfortunately, many of those requirements are under consideration for exemption by our village leaders just to accommodate one developer’s plan. Is this what we really want for our community?

We consider it a privilege to have lived in Mount Horeb for several decades. We truly appreciate the careful planning that has resulted in the unique character of our village’s Main Street. We live on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, just a few doors down from the proposed building complex, so to us, this is also personal. We consider this “monstrosity” an invasion of privacy which will loom large over our historic neighborhood and cast a long shadow on those of us who live nearby (not to mention the parking and traffic congestion it will create). That’s not what we want – would you?

Please contact the village plan commission and village board and let them know what you think.

Have you ever needed to keep your items just a little bit longer? Did you know you may be able to do so? If your checked out items aren't reserved for someone else, you can renew them!

Renewal is easy! You can renew materials online through your account, over the phone, or stop by and we can renew them for you. Another bonus of the renewal is that it helps us increase our

checkout numbers! We have been fine-free for five years, but if the item is more than 28 days overdue, our computer system assumes its lost forever and automatically adds a

replacement fee to your account. To avoid giving yourself a minor panic attack when you see charges on your library account, you can renew your items! Remember, if no one

else has the item on hold, you can renew it to avoid that "Lost" status and subsequent automatic charge. Don't worry! If a charge is added, it is removed when you bring the item(s) back!

our users are Spanish-only speakers," Wall said. "Having this version available has been huge."

Since launch, the app has drawn thousands of users and tens of thousands of searches, helping people across Wisconsin quietly and anonymously find the support they need.

While the 211 phone line connects callers with live operators who can ask follow-up questions—about rent, kids, or utilities—the app takes a different approach. It allows users to browse at their own pace, bookmark favorite resources, and return as often as they'd like. Registration is optional, and even then, no personal information is stored.

"You can be sitting at home in your chair wondering, 'What do they have for utility bill assistance? What about mental health?'" Wall explained. "The app gives you the ability to just look at it on your own time."

Unlike many states where 211 is localized, all eight of Wisconsin's 211 centers are on board with the app. That means the system works anywhere in the state. "If you're in Green Bay, Ashland, or La Crosse—you put in your zip code, and your local resources pop up," Wall said. "That was our goal: completely accessible statewide."

The success has already drawn national attention. States like Rhode Island and Indiana have reached out about creating their own apps after hearing about

Wisconsin's model. For people without smartphones or internet access, United Way developed a companion kiosk program. About 60 kiosks—each a refurbished iPad mounted in a secure stand—are now deployed in schools, libraries, food pantries, homeless shelters, and hospitals across seven counties.

One of the earliest success stories came from Mount Horeb schools. Teachers and counselors knew families were struggling but reluctant to ask for help. United Way created a student-friendly presentation, and as Wall spoke, students began scanning the QR code on the screen and downloading the app. Soon after, the school ordered its own kiosk.

The model is spreading quickly. Edgerton Hospi-

tal purchased three kiosks, with United Way donating a fourth. Middleton and McFarland schools are pursuing the program. After a shooting at Abundant Life Christian School, United Way placed a kiosk on site to give families immediate access to resources, then kept it there for ongoing support. United Way staff even assemble and program the devices before installation.

United Way is already thinking about the next stage: push notifications. That feature would allow the app to instantly notify users when shelters open early during freezing weather, when food pantries run short on supplies, or when hours change due to storms.

"We get calls every day from agencies with updates," Wall said. "Right

now, users have to call or check manually. With push notifications, we could get that info to them instantly."

Another frequent question: more languages. For now, Spanish was the priority, but United Way continues to provide live translation over the phone in more than 300 languages through its Language Line service.

Beyond individual use, the app provides a window into community needs. The most common searches—housing, food, and utility assistance—highlight persistent challenges across Wisconsin.

That data shapes how United Way allocates funding and gives policymakers concrete insights. "We get calls from mayors, county executives, and legislators

asking, 'What's going on in my district?'" Wall said. "We can pull the data right away and show them what people are searching for."

For Wall, who came to United Way after a career in government, the work is deeply rewarding—even when the need is overwhelming. "Our folks taking the calls hear a lot of vicarious trauma," he admitted. "Everyone who calls is in need, and that can be hard. But they also know they're making a difference, and that's what makes it fulfilling."

At its core, Wall said, the mission is simple: "Our job is putting resources in people's hands. Whatever makes it easier for people to get help."

forty-five parking stalls. The remaining three floors are apartment units, with eighty-three bedrooms. An additional twenty-four outside parking stalls are shown behind the building, abutting the alley.

Also included in the packet was a list of "Talking Points" to use in discussions with neighbors, friends, and in writing letters to the editor to the Mount Horeb Mail as well as to members of the Village Board and Plan Commission. Kelley read the nine Talking Points, giving a summary of concerns by both the Committee and residents who are familiar with the proposed apartment complex.

The group's position is that:

*The building will ruin the historic downtown, leading to a loss in village identity and tourism*

*It is in the Central Business District for zoning purposes. Apartments in the District are to be an accessory to businesses, yet this building is ninety-one percent apartments*

*For the nine percent commercial shown in the developer's materials, there is*

*not a single parking space earmarked for staff or customers.*

*The building does not meet the spirit of the Village Comprehensive Plan, written in 2022, and does not meet numerous pieces of the zoning code, whether for the Central Business District or Planned Development*

*There is not enough parking. It is already bad and going to get worse once the approved Steve Brown 63-unit apartment complex is built on S. First and Front St*

*Traffic congestion will increase and lead to safety concerns*

*Since the Steve Brown apartments are not yet built, the congestion and increased traffic has not yet been encountered and the proposed Main Street complex will only add to the traffic and congestion.*

*Housing is important and more is needed in Mount Horeb. However, there are numerous (128 approved, 176 pending) other projects underway that many residents are not aware of that will help with this need.*

*The role of the Village Board and Plan Commission is to enforce zoning codes, stay true to the Comprehensive Plan and to listen to the will of the people. They have the ability and responsibility to abide by the regulations and plans defined and approved by their predecessors.*

*Before turning the meeting over for Q&A, Kelley*

*asked "What is the problem? It's too big."*

Audience Thoughts  
Sale said, "one thing that has not been talked about a whole lot in our Talking Points is what is the economy in Mount Horeb? Our industry is tourism, and where does tourism occur? In our wonderful downtown. I think with this huge building on Main Street it will deter people from coming downtown, finding a parking spot, and walking around this building." Continuing, "What other employer do we have in town besides our downtown people? I read not long ago that our largest employer was our School District, so what does that say? Our industry is downtown, our beautiful downtown."

Diane Pladziewicz asked "Did anyone do any urban planning? Are these apartment buildings going to be rented?"

Karen Erickson opined JG Development has done work for her family, and they do an excellent job but wonders "why are they still pursuing this with so many reasons against it? Why are they pushing so hard for this?"

Diane Barth questioned "since this is in a historic district, why wasn't this canned" before it got to this point?

Kurt Nowka, a local history buff, briefly explained from the days the area near the Union Cemetery was

the town center, following the Old Military Road in the 1830s and requiring it (downtown) to be moved in 1881 to Main Street due to the railway. Mount Horeb's downtown is listed as a National Historic District. Nowka said, "We are a unique community because we have a small, condensed downtown. We cannot be industrial based because of our topography issue; everything goes downhill one way or the other." Continuing, "as we developed, our commercial area was right next door to residential areas and it continues north and south, east and west." He opined that we were bound by Stuart Lake and now we are bound by Hwy 18/151, so everything feeds on our Main Street corridor. "Because we are listed as a Downtown Historic District, it includes these two properties [currently on the property in discussion] as well as others going east and west. There has always been one structure per lot," said Nowka. "We are not Verona or Middleton...should we be"? There are those who believe we should be; we need to keep pushing and if they [Village Board] believe their position is righteous, put it out for a referendum" and put it out to the community to vote on it, letting the chips fall as they may".

Moen mentioned although Olson's building is a century old, it was never registered by Bill Olson [the prior

owner] as a historic building with the State, adding "they [both existing buildings] can be torn down. She opined she and the other Committee members worked hard to get people to attend the meeting and was hoping there were at least 100 more present.

Cindy Jensen said, "everyone I've talked to is against this building so don't let the number here tonight fool you and how we show that is another issue." My question is "are there any regulations for parking in an alley" since the back of the building in on an alley?

Julie Nalliet-Nowak asked "if it is not zoned for this building, why are they just going to change it for the developer? It goes against the Comprehensive Plan already."

Nowka mentioned if developers have a vision that is outside the confines of the zoning code, there are ways to mitigate zoning by requesting a variance which is a catchall and called a Planned Unit Development (PUD). "There are, at times, reasons to do it. Municipalities can have properties that have lost their function and need some help." When done, it requires extra oversight by the Plan Commission.

Clarey said, "the board is hoping citizens will get tired (of this) and go away. You cannot do that; we need to fight. We voted them [board] in, there was not a choice." She continued to encour-

age people to attend village meetings that include discussion on the Main Street project. Plan Commission meetings are held on the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of every month, and Village Board meetings are held on the 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday of every month. Amanda DeSonia recently moved to 104 N Third Street. The detached garage entrance is directly across from the proposed building. Her family recently installed a camera that records foot traffic, cars, scooters, trucks, and anything else using the alley. Every seven minutes the camera alerts them of a new recording showing activity in the alley. DeSonia believes many use it as a short cut to the stop light on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street which shows there is already a traffic problem in the downtown area. She questioned whether a traffic study has ever or should be done on the alley before a decision is made one way or the other on the 214-220 Main Street apartment complex.

The meeting was wrapped up within an hour and Kelley urging people to write letters, talk to their friends, attend village meetings, and get a yard sign.



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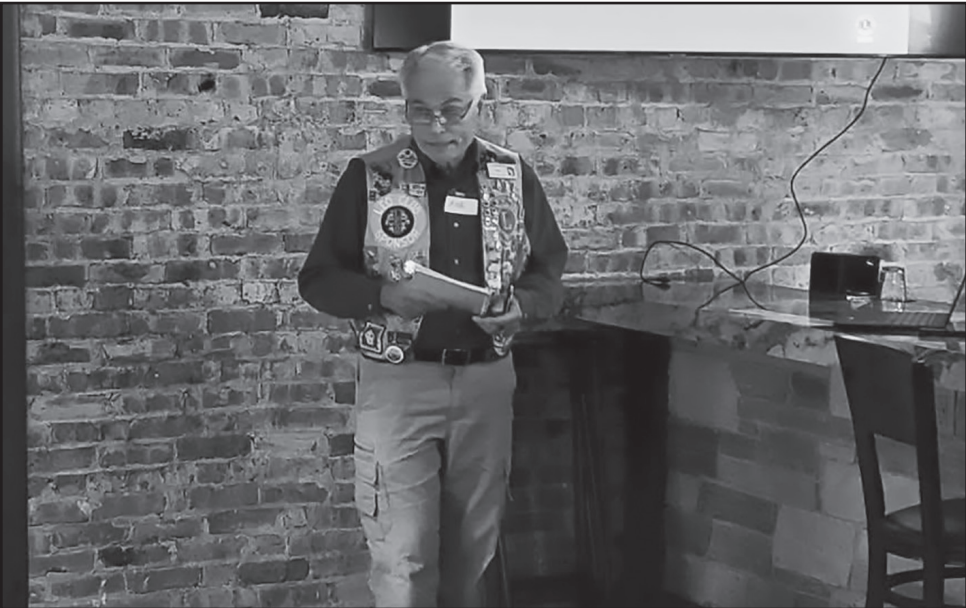

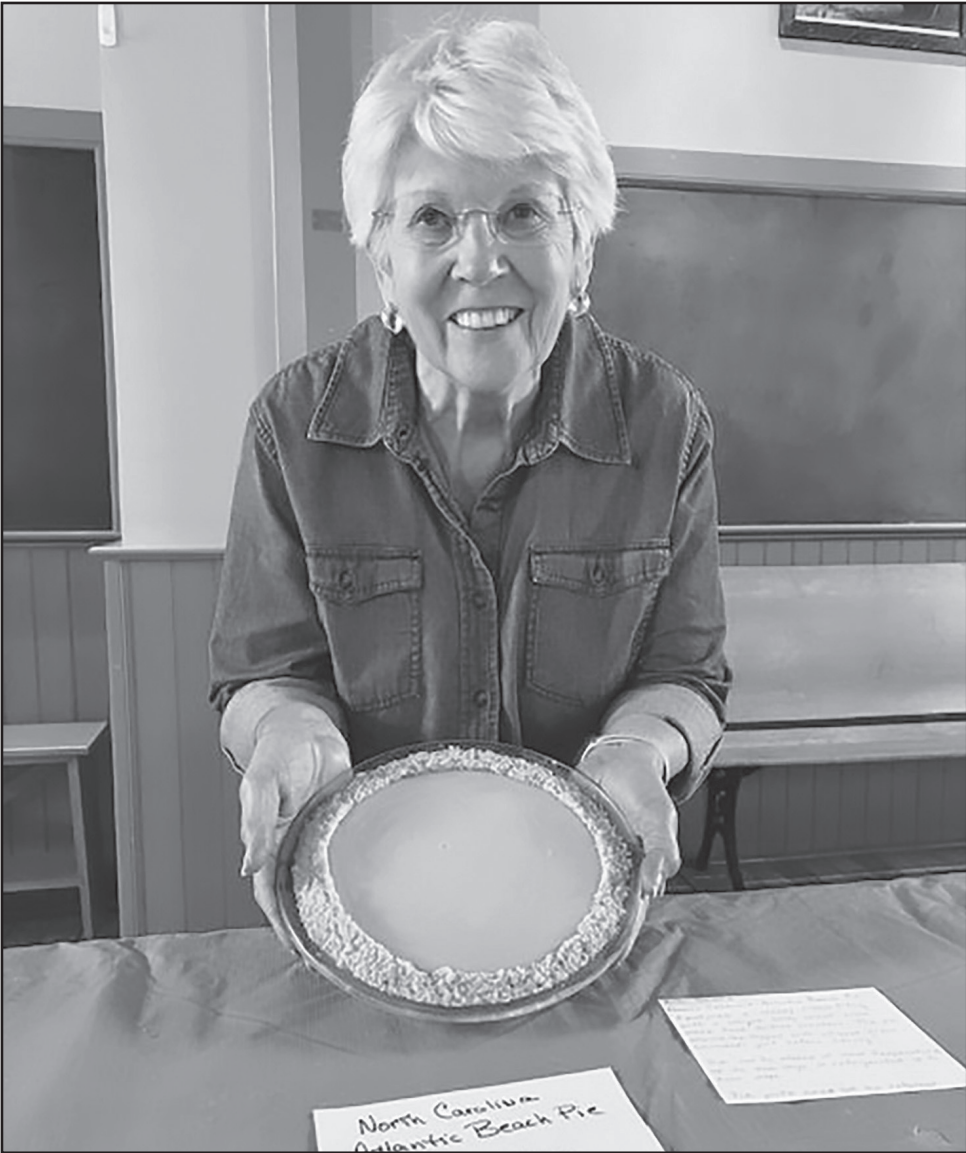

### DHS Continues to Recommend the COVID-19 Vaccine

**Statewide medical order makes it easier for Wisconsinites to get the vaccine**

As directed by Gov. Tony Evers’ Executive Order #275 the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has reviewed the scientific evidence surrounding the COVID-19 vaccine. Based on this review, DHS issued a statewide standing medical order that allows most Wisconsinites who want the vaccine to get it at pharmacies across the state without a prescription. DHS continues to recommend the COVID-19 vaccine for Wisconsinites 6 months and older during this fall respiratory virus season. This echoes the science-based recommendations of

the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American Academy of Family Physicians.

“Everyone in Wisconsin should be able to make the choice to protect themselves and their families against COVID-19, and that choice should be based on the best available science and medical recommendations,” said DHS Secretary Kirsten Johnson. “As the federal government limits access to the vaccine, we want to reassure Wisconsinites that recommendations from our nation’s leading medical associations are clear, and we will work every day to support access to care and resources to help families make the best decisions on how to protect themselves

from illness and disease.”

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved the updated 2025-2026 vaccine only for people 65 years and older and those under 65 who have high risk conditions, conflicting with both previous recommendations issued by the CDC and with updated recommendations from the nation’s leading medical organizations. These organizations recommend that everyone 6 months and older receive the updated 2025-2026 COVID-19 vaccine. This is especially important for:

- People 65 and older.
- Those who are at risk for severe complications from COVID-19 especially infants and children under age 2, those who are preg-

nant, planning to become pregnant, or who have recently given birth; and children, adolescents, and adults with underlying health conditions.

□ Those who have never received a COVID-19 vaccine.

“Evidence shows that COVID-19 vaccines lower the chance of severe illness across age groups, and this is especially important for those at higher risk,” said Dr. Ryan Westergaard, Chief Medical Officer and State Epidemiologist in the Division of Public Health. “Because the benefits outweigh the risks for almost all people, DHS supports making the updated vaccine available so that every Wisconsinite can decide whether vaccination is the right choice for them.”

Availability of the COVID-19 vaccine is anticipated to increase in the state as health care providers receive vaccine from manufacturers. While some providers, clinics, and pharmacies have already received shipments of the 2025-2026 COVID-19 vaccine, others are still waiting to receive supplies. Wisconsinites who want to protect themselves against COVID-19 are encouraged to contact their local doctor’s office, pharmacy, or community health center to see if they will be offering COVID-19 vaccine this season.

Wisconsin Medicaid will also continue to cover the COVID-19 vaccine for eligible Medicaid members, including children and individuals who are pregnant. All government-

tal self-funded and fully insured group health plans and individual health plans regulated by the Wisconsin Office of the Commissioner of Insurance are also expected to cover, without cost sharing, all costs associated with administration of COVID-19 vaccinations for all policyholders pursuant to their bulletin. Anyone with questions regarding payments of coverage of COVID-19 vaccines should contact their health insurer.

Wisconsinites can get more information about the COVID-19 vaccine from their health care provider or pharmacy, or on the DHS COVID-19: Vaccine webpage. Those who need assistance accessing health care or health care coverage can dial 211 for help finding local resources.

Dave Chancellor loves the Mount Horeb cross country invite.

The Vikings' coach enjoys playing host. He likes the size — 11 teams — of the meet. And he likes the fact the varsity and JV run together, even though the two races are scored separately.

"This is a fun meet for us to host," Chancellor said of last Saturday's meet that was held at Norsk Golf Club. "We're really grateful for the folks at Norsk for working with us to put this one on. Although it's a more modestly sized meet with just 11 teams, we have good competition with some very strong programs there on both the boys and girls sides."

While there was plenty of good competition, they couldn't catch Mount Horeb's girls.

The Vikings' girls finished with just 39 points, outdistancing runner-up McFarland (56). Monona Grove (75), Sauk Prairie (109) and DeForest (138) rounded out the top five.

"I was curious to see how we would run against McFarland's girls at this one," Chancellor said. "I don't particularly care about rankings, but McFarland's girls were ranked sixth in the state in D2 going into the weekend and I tend to think they should be ranked higher based on what they've done the last couple of weeks. For us to come out on top of this one with an imperfect team performance was encouraging."

Mount Horeb junior Willa Vigliotta was third overall, completing the 5,000-meter course in 19 minutes, 48.4 seconds. Freshman Isla Odgers was fourth individually (19:48.8), just a nose behind Vigliotta.

"Having Willa and Isla finish together in third and fourth was important for our team score," Chancellor said. "Willa was where I expected her to be, but Isla's performance was a good one. It's the best race I've seen her run and she closed extremely well in the last half mile of the race."

Sophomore Mia Caygill was eighth (20:21.3), ju-

"All of the boys teams at this meet are pretty solid, with a lot of bigger D1 programs like DeForest, Madison East, and Madison La Follette, plus Badger Small Conference competitors like McFarland, Sauk, and Reedsburg," Chancellor said. "Going into this, we knew that we were going to be without Jaxon Hughes and Blake Losenegger — two guys who would otherwise be in our top five most meets — but are dealing with injuries that will have them out for a while."

Junior Samuel Wyse led the Vikings with a 17th place finish, completing the 5,000-meter race in 18:01.4.

"Sam has been super consistent all season long and has established a solid floor, but he's still hunting for that breakthrough race," Chancellor said.

Senior Desmond Kelley was 49th (19:35.4), junior Nicholai Solodin-Braun was 55th (19:49.4), senior Tim Stoddard was 56th (19:50.8) and senior Marc Stoddard was 57th (20:00.8).

"Desmond Kelley was back as our No. 2 this week

and put together a decent race, just a bit ahead of Nicholai Solodin-Braun," Chancellor said. "This was Nicholai's best race of the season so far and it was nice to see things starting to click for him again."

"Tim Kruse was just a bit off his time from River Valley last week, but on Saturday's more challenging course, it was a good run for him. Marc Stoddard ran a career best. I think this was a really meaningful meet for Marc with it being his last time racing on his home course after four years on the team, so to come away with his best yet cross country race is really special."

In all, Chancellor was thrilled how Mount Horeb's own invitational went.

"Overall, I'm happy with how our team is running and getting along right now," he said. "Across our 70 runners, we're seeing good, consistent effort in practice and kids helping each other get the work done."

"For our boys, a lot of our focus in these next couple of weeks will go toward bringing up our average and finding those spots

in races where we can pick up a few more points. For our girls, we really just need to stay healthy and

clean up some of our pacing as we prepare to race later in the season."

Sophomore Ella Baber finished with a 44 to tie for fifth place. Baber provided the highlight of the day by holing out for eagle from 170 yards on the par-four, eighth hole and added a par at No. 9.

Junior Jadyn Schellp-

feffer and senior Sonja Schreiber had matching rounds of 51, while senior Carmen Oglesby added a 58 to round out the scoring for the Vikings.

“We played well as a team,” Krentz said. “Delaina and Ella had really good rounds and we received solid scores from both Jadyn and Sonja, helping us maintain our second-place position (behind Edgewood) in the conference standings.

“I was really pleased with our ability to stay out of trouble, as we only had one hole score higher than a seven from our four counting individual scores. I thought we also did a good job on the greens, as they are the biggest ones we see all year and we were able to limit the number of three putts, which is not easy to do.”

### MOUNT HOREB TRIANGULAR

Lancaster won the triangular with a 187, and the Vikings were second with a 193 on Sept. 18. Darlington was a distant third at 214.

Nicewander led Mount Horeb with a 45, parring three holes on her way to a third place individual finish out of 15 players. Baber posted a 48 to tie for fourth, while Schreiber shot a 51

to finish sixth, highlighted by a birdie on the par-five second hole and pars on No. 5 and 6.

Schellpfeffer also shot a 51, tying for seventh.

“It was not quite as good of a performance for us,” Krentz said. “While we did not have the result we would have liked, we were able to honor our three seniors — Delaina, Sonja, and Carmen — in the final home meet of their careers.

## Mount Horeb tops Dodgeville, falls to Fort

Mount Horeb’s boys soccer team is looking for a branch of consistency to hold onto.

Midway through the season, the Vikings are 4-4 overall and 1-2 in the Badger Small Conference.

And each time Mount Horeb seemingly gains momentum, it hits a bump in the road.

The Vikings had another up and down week, dropping a 3-0 decision to Fort Atkinson on Sept. 16, then rebounding with a 4-0 win over Dodgeville last Saturday.

“Right now we need to work on being more consistent and playing with more of an edge,” Mount Horeb coach Rick Gage said. “When we play with confidence and play hard we will be a team that will be tough to beat. “This was a game that we should be able to control and get a winning result,” Gage said. “Overall we thought we would be able to control the ball and possess the ball on Dodgeville, but we knew that they had a strong center back who would make scoring difficult.”

riod. “The fourth quarter came and it felt like we got too relaxed. We need to have more of that mindset that we have to keep the foot on the gas especially from the defensive standpoint.

“That’s where I was a little disappointed. The first three quarters, I felt like we did really well, but not the fourth quarter.”

St. Arnauld MH-B has yet to put all three phases together in the same game.

“I’d really like to see our team hit all three strides one night — our specials, offense and defense all play well,” St. Arnauld said. “It hasn’t been that way yet this year.”

MH-B, which improved to 4-1 overall and 3-0 in the Badger Small, won a pair of crossover games with the East Central Conference, which count in Badger Small Conference play for postseason playoff consideration.

So, the Vikings were eager to open their schedule against Badger Small Conference teams by sending a message to Stoughton, which it routed 54-0 at home a year ago.

Mission accomplished.

“It’s always great to get a conference win under your belt,” said Wilson, a North Dakota State recruit. “To be able to come into Stoughton and put up the performance we did was awesome.

“But we have to get to work next week because Sauk Prairie is a good program. They’re going to give us everything we’ve got. We don’t want them to ruin Homecoming. So, we need to stay focused on the football part of it.”

MH-B took the opening kickoff and drove down the field, taking 5 minutes off the clock. Hendrickson, who has become a dual threat this season, rushed for 10 yards and a first down on the first play of the series.

Hendrickson said becoming a threat to run on any play has opened the Vikings’ offense.

“It opens cutback lanes for Jack (Wilson),” Hendrickson said. “It makes those ends get up the field a little bit to respect my running game,” he said. “(Jack) has cutback lanes and obviously it spreads them out, too.

“We scripted three plays and two of them were options right away. I was like if it was there, I was going to take it and do what I can with it. That set the tone the first play.”

MH-B faced a fourth-and-eight at the Stoughton

14, but an apparent touch-down pass from Hendrickson to sophomore receiver Django Christian was ruled out of the back of the end zone, turning the ball over to Stoughton.

“We had a good opportunity, but a false start hurt us,” St. Arnauld said of scoring on the opening drive. “There was a dispute between the officials down here on whether it was a catch or not. The guy on our side said it was a catch. But the guy in the back started signaling even though ours was saying it was a touchdown. He had the back foot down.

“So, it was a dispute, but they didn’t communicate, whatever, but that’s fine. The defense came out and got a three-and-out.”

That included holding Stoughton to one yard in two rushing plays and a one-yard completion.

“Run defense is definitely something we take a lot of pride in,” said Wilson, who also starts at middle linebacker. “We have a great front six. Shout out to the defensive line taking up blocks.

“Ayden Knight, (Minnesota-Moorhead recruit) Harrison Walker and Parker Nihles do a great job taking up blocks and making the linebackers be able to play free and not have to worry about the offensive linemen and just make tackles.”

MH-B then took advantage of a 22-yard punt to start on Stoughton’s 38-yard line, and the offense quickly went to work.

MH-B’s nine-play drive was capped by junior running back Eli Maier’s 1-yard touchdown plunge on a second-and-goal call. After Maier converted the first of his four two-point PATs in the game, MH-B had an 8-0 lead and never looked back.

Stoughton (3-2, 2-1) countered with a nine-play, 66-yard drive that ended on Logan Hedstrom’s 5-yard touchdown run. But that was as close as Stoughton would get the rest of the game.

“I’ve got a feeling we will see them at some point later in the season,” Stoughton coach Jason Becker said of MH-B. “We just have to play better defensively and make more plays when we need to offensively.”

After a three-and-out on its next possession, Mount Horeb/Barneveld closed out the first half with back-to-back scoring drives.

Maier’s 2-yard touchdown burst wrapped up a five-play, 59-yard drive with 4:33 left before halftime. His two-point PAT gave MH-B a 16-7 lead.

The visiting Vikings weren’t finished either.

MH-B took over on its own 28 with 1:40 left in the second quarter and no timeouts left.

Hendrickson then hooked up with senior tight end Hayden Anderson on four of the ensuing nine plays on the drive, including a 17-yard touchdown strike as time expired in the first half.

Anderson, a St. Thomas recruit, had been held without a catch until that final drive.

“The coaches just dialed it up well. I was ready to go,” said Anderson, who finished with a game-high six catches for 96 yards and a TD. “(Stoughton) left me alone and we took advantage of it.”

That eventually proved to be too much for Stoughton to overcome.

“The play of the game was giving up that score before halftime,” Becker said. “We go into the half at 16-7, I think our guys have a different mindset.”

Hendrickson said with 7 seconds remaining, the Vikings were determined to score.

“We were taking a shot,” Hendrickson said. “If I was going to miss, it would be high and away. That’s exactly what I tried to do. (The defender) was hand fighting with Hayden, but Hayden came down with it with his strong hands.”

Stoughton had a chance to cut into the MH-B lead when it took the opening kickoff of the second half. But a 10-play drive stalled,

amassing just 17 yards as the MH-B defense refused to break and forced a punt.

“The backbreaker was that first drive of the second half,” Becker said. “The tight end gets free over the middle and drops that pass. We catch that pass there, we potentially score and make it a one-score game. We keep that tighter.

“But hats off to Bret (St. Arnauld) and his staff and their team. They continue to make plays when they need to. Quite honestly, (Hendrickson) was the player of the game. Every time we had him bottled up, he found ways to get free and make plays with his feet probably more so than with his arm.”

MH-B followed up its defensive stop with back-to-back touchdown passes on its ensuing possessions.

First, Hendrickson connected with junior tight end Henry DeRosier on a 12-yard score with 2:35 left in the third quarter.

“He has two catches for two touchdowns,” Hendrickson said of DeRosier. “Last week, it was a hard action fake, I rolled out and dumped it off to him.

“This one was a tight end screen. We were faking a wheel (route) outside to the left. I tried to look them off and then dump it off in the middle. He was running a fake arrow and then cut back inside.”

MH-B extended its lead to 38-7 with 9:17 left in the game after Hendrickson and senior receiver Colin Haag combined for a 24-

yard touchdown strike.

“He ran a crossing route, and we had a post curl right behind him,” Hendrickson said of Haag. “They brought their mike backer up right away, so (Haag) had space for days.”

Stoughton then sandwiched a pair of touchdown passes from senior quarterback Colyn Kotlowski to Devin Rogers and Jackson Keis, respectively, around Hendrickson’s final touchdown pass to Wilson midway through the final period.

“It was just a little running back screen pass,” said Wilson, who showed off his improved speed by breaking free for a 53-yard score. “I caught the ball behind the line, and the O-Line went down the field and blocked for me. I was able to catch it and make a few moves.

“But really it was the O-line and the receivers who were blocking to the whistle all the way down the field, putting in a great effort. That really opened it up for me.”

Wilson said the Vikings have plenty of work left to do to reach their full potential.

“We really pride ourselves on that,” Wilson said of the MH-B run defense, which held Stoughton to just 33 yards in 13 carries in the first half. “But we really need to work on that carrying through the end of the game. We let up a little too much at the end with those two touchdowns. That’s something we need

to work on in practice this week.”
